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

These announcements were then followed by a moment of silence.

Roger introduced the Executive Board then recognized the Regional officers and Proxies. He also recognized Jim Hildebrand, past president of NCCC 1971-1972.

OFFICER REPORTS

Carolyn Montgomery – Secretary- No corrections to the May meeting minutes. Motion to accept the minutes as written was made and seconded; motion passed.

As there were some signed proxies that did not make it to the meeting, Roger asked for a motion to approve the proxies for attendance only to be mailed by the following regions – Michigan, West Region, Rocky Mountain, Roadrunner and East Ohio. Motion was made and seconded. This allows them to be present for attendance but not for voting. The regions have one week to send the proxies in to the secretary. The 2005 tax return has been filed and accepted by the IRS. Eckler's rebates are in and she mailed these to all the REs so be on the lookout for these.

She will be running for Treasurer for the next term.

Pat Kelly – FCOA - There are currently 2,456 members of FCOA. She has assigned #3,300, a little girl from the Roadrunner region, and her sponsor is a member of the El Paso Corvette Club. Michigan Region is the third region to top 300 FCOA members. Mentioned the tire raffle,which will be drawn at the end of this week and thanked all that helped sell the tickets.

Hal Bellamy – Business Manager - There has been another claim, again a canopy blew over on a car. This canopy was set up by the person who was chairman of the car show, canopy blew over on his car, he was also a participant in the show, his canopy, his car, his car show. The claim was denied. Hal asked those of us in attendance if we had within the last 30 days actually read the waivers that we had signed. Very few hands went up. On the waiver, in big red letters, it states –read and

Jerry Limpach – Public Relations- His position will also be open this fall as he has served the two terms, so he cannot run again. The major duties are to maintain the traveling displays, maintain the NCCC kiosk at the NCM, and in charge of advertising for NCCC in the National magazines when the budget permits.

The display will be at Carlisle and Mackinaw City at the end of August, at Effingham in September and Eckler's in October. This leaves one display available for usage during September and October. If you have something going on and would like the display, send him an email.

Roger M. reminded all that the jobs/positions available for 2007/2008 are on the website along with the job descriptions.

Gary Foster – Sgt. at Arms - It is his job for each of the governor's meetings to contact potential vendors and asked them to contribute to door prizes. Last time he was very successful, as he had items from Corvette America, Jeg's, Mid-America, ZIP products, Ozzie's restaurant in St. Louis, NCCC merchandise and Corsica exhaust system, (will have more on this specific item later in the year). Please support these vendors and those that are here with us this week. Without the support we get from them, we would not have any door prizes.

The candidates running for office will provide the hospitality for September.

Sylvia Hoaldridge – Publications- The summer issue is in the mail, should be in your mailbox by the time you return home from Convention. Deadline for submitting articles for the next issue, which is the Convention issue, will be September [‡].

Patrick Dolan – Director of Charity- Patrick advised that the Heratta's had an accident on the way to convention and they are fine, however the vehicles are not. Chuck was concerned about his responsibilities to NCCC and called Patrick to ask how best to get this resolved.

2007 raffle tickets will be available August 14th. Contact him if tickets are wanted. The first two shows are scheduled, Carlisle and Mackinaw City. Will start on the new raffle at these shows.

Michigan Region donated \$1,000 to one of the scholarships. Will be giving away eight \$1,000 scholarships at the banquet this Friday.

Jim Harris – Convention Steering Committee - Jim recapped the Convention programs.

2007 Program – John and Sue McGee, any questions see them.

2008 Program – Had a presentation from Ron Ruston and Joe Reese as they are making a bid for the Tulsa OK. area.

2009 Program – Two areas interested in the convention, which are Michigan and Colorado.

At the next meeting he will be reviewing the three candidates for the Convention treasurer position for 2007, Peg Quine, Mary Bellamy, and Jay Hommer

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There's more to Sebring than its famous racetrack

SEBRING, Fla. - Every March, this small central Florida to wn becomes a household word all over the world. That will happen again this year when the 54th annual 12 Hours of Sebring automobile race takes place here.

The March 15-18 classic, America's greatest sports car endurance competition, br ings thousands of spectators here, f illing the 3.7-mile track's infield with spectators and RVs, and sending prices at the trackside Chateau Elan hotel as high as \$500 a night.

But there's much more to the Se bring track than this single racing e vent. The roar of high-po wered cars flying around the track at speeds up to 200 miles an hour can be heard throughout the year.

Two schools teach race w annabes and thrill-seekers the art of racing all year around, and another major race event, the Historic Fall Classic, draws more then 300 competing cars in October.

The track is also used as a training and testing ground for teams practicing for such famous competitions as the Indianapolis 500 and the Le Mans races.

While the Sebring Raceway has been a growing concern since 1952, it really got a shot in the arm when nicotine-patch manufacturer Don Panoz bought the track in 1997 and transformed it into a state-of-the-art race way.

He constructed a mile long pit row and garage area with elevated viewing and hospitality suites. He built a new 1.5-mile FT road course, set up his Panoz Racing School and built the 81-room Chateau Elan trackside.

Today, fans can watch the races not only from the paddock and general admission areas, but also from suites at the Chateau Elan or from hospitality suites a bove pit row. Admission to the 12 Hours of Sebring ranges from \$70 general admission to \$500 for seating in Club Sebring.

At other times of the year, the track welcomes guests who want to watch team training (except when the teams specify privacy), or attend one of the two racing schools, Panoz and Skin Barber

Several regimens are offered by the schools, including sessions on clutching, downshifting, braking, cornering and other aspects of racing, before students are allowed to run solo at high speeds on the track.

Three-day sessions run around \$3,000.

From the thumping excitement of car racing to the quiet beauty of nature seems like a long leap, but in Sebring it's just a short drive from the track to Highlands Hammock State Park, one of Florida's first preserves.

Created in the 1930s, this park is one of the few locales in Florida with both virgin hardwood and sabal palm forests.

Probably the most popular site, according to park manager Peter Anderson, is the Cypress Sw amp Trail, whose boardwalk passes over eerily quiet waters surrounded by tall cypress trees. Other trails take visitors to a thousand-year-old oak, a sour orange grove and a fern garden.

In winter, the park schedules nature walks, a variety of ranger activities and Saturday night campfire programs, as well as year-round guided tram tours.


The park also has a campground with 138 sites and lots of roaming armadillos.

Even before Highlands Hammock was founded, though, Sebring was a thriving winter resort. In the 1920s it had nine major resort hotels, among them the Kenilworth Lodge and Harder Hall. The grand old Kenilworth, recently refurbished, is still going strong. Harder Hall is undergoing renovation.

Meanwhile, Sebring's downtown centers on the circle George E. Sebring designed in 1911 as the focus of the town he founded.

There are such shops as Gifts From the Past, which features old-time items such as a 4-foot Betty Boop doll, plus restaurants, a pottery shop and clothing store.

The NCCC Scholarship Committee awards \$1000 scholarships to worthy young people, who have some connection with NCCC through a f ather, mother, grandfather, grandmother, etc., who has been a member of NCCC for at least three years. "Some connection" implies that the applicant's relatives should have knowledge of the various requirement of the Scholarship Program.

NEW beginning in 2007 – If the relative is not the Applicant's parent, the relative must write a letter to be included with the completed application indicating the following:

His/Her relationship with the Applicant His/Her NCCC Member Number If He/She will be the Applicant Sponsor

If He/She has been closely involved with NCCC for a period of three or more years.

The deadline may change from year to year depending upon the date of the annual NCCC Convention

THE LAST LEG

Before going into the details of "The Last Leg," it is important to clarify a detail that will be necessary to some readers. This is about a group of "SolidAxle" Corvettes, their drivers, their passengers and those touched by the adventure. A solid axle Corvette, sometimes called a straight axle Corvette, is one from the model years 1953 through 1962. The nickname comes from the rear axle design used in these cars. Solid axles are typical of the rear axle design used in that ea and well beyond and even by many today. These vehicles stand out from the 1963 and later year Corv ettes, because in 1963 Corvette introduced independent rear suspension. Corvette independent rear suspension has the differential mounted to a frame cross member and half shaft axles to each rear wheel. This allows each wheel to react independently, keeping the tires in better contact with the road and reducing the unsprung weight of the vehicle.

Our Last Leg adventure started long before the actual wheels began to turn. In the

winter, 2004 issue of "On Solid Ground" (the national Solid Axle Corvette Club official magazine), there was a short atticle about a team of Solid Axle Corvette owners from the Pacific Northwest planning a trip in late September 2005 to Chicago and then following Route 66 from Lak e Michigan to the Pacific Ocean at Santa Monica, California. This article was written by Mr. Jerry Little, the leader



of the group. After contact with Jerry, he thought it would be appropriate for local Southern California SolidAxles and Corvette enthusiasts to have the honor of leading them from Barstow, California to the ocean. This laid the groundwork for "The Last Leg," Barstow to Santa Monica and the Pacific Ocean.

Several e-mail exchanges with Jerry occurred in the following months. He g ave all the details of the plans. He established some ground rules to be follo wed in planning, such as maximum speed and maximum distance and/or time between stops. Jerry established the Holiday Inn on Route 66 in Barstow as the stopping point prior to the last leg.

Properly planning the trip required an early trip to Barstow and back along the route to make sure all could get



as much as possible out of the trip. Barstw has used its location on Route 66 in establishing much of their local color. People at the Holiday Inn agreed to reserve parking in a select location. The hotel has a lar ge map of the complete Route 66 on the wall behind the front desk. There are Route 66 murals painted on the sides on man y buildings. There is also "The Mother Road, Route 66 Museum" in town. The schedule was to be there on a Tuesday and the museum is only open on weeknds, but they would make a special of fort to be open on that particular Tuesday afternoon. Then the route w as run for a trial to locate appropriate gas stops and points of interest. The points of interest would include the Wigwam Motel, Legends Classic Diner, and Team Chevrolet, all located on Route 66.

Jerry's progress was tracked and they stayed right on schedule. Early October in Southern California was still very warm, actually hot, during the day. The solid axle caravan spent the night before Barstow in Needles. The plan was to get to Barstow before them and make sure all w as ready. As all well-planned things go, a major



brush fire along I-15 got in the way of an early arri val and all five lanes of I-15 tr affic was rerouted to, you guessed it, old Route 66. The high temperature and stop-and-go traffic was a test for the old '61 Cor vette, but it showed its true colors and made it through to Barstow just after the group's arrival. All were in the parking lot of the Holiday Inn for the first face-to-face

introductions. It was time to check out all the cars and get the story of the trip in the shade of a tree near the hotel. Then it was off to The Mother Road Route 66 Museum. The museum people were great hosts as e veryone explored the museum and took advantage of some photo opportunities. It was then time to return to the hotel for dinner and prepare for an early morning departure.

The route was only 155.5 miles. The estimated eight hours for the route and stops seemed adequate. There was breakfast and a departure just before dawn. The morning had a typical desert chill but not enough to warrant keeping the convertible tops up. Old Route 66 is good and wide open. Along the road are signs of the devastation caused by the opening of the interestate highway, where once-thriving businesses are now boarded-up buildings. The route takes us past the towns of Hodge

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and Silver Lakes and the Two 66 Sixes Company then under I-15. At the entrance to



the city of Victorville, there is a large Route 66 overhead sign and Seventh Street is old 66. Route 66 goes onto the Interstate at the west end of Victorville. Just over Cajon Pass summit, at the Route 138 exit from the Interstate, is the first gas stop. Back on the Interstate for about a mile past the first stop is the Kenwood exit and it is back on Route 66. Historic Route 66 signs are painted on the highway surface. Old Route

66 winds the group into the west end of San Bernardino and west, now on Foothill Boulevard about two miles to the first photo stop for the group at the Wigwam Motel. Brothers The Wigwam is still in operation and the owners treated the group to views of the rooms. Each room is independent in individual buildings in the shape of wigwams. Pasadena.

Continuing west, 66 passes Euclid Avenue where the statue of the "Madonna of the Trail" stands in the center of Euclid overlooking Route 66. The solid axle caravan is joined along the route by members of Corvettes of Temecula Valley. Route 66 enters the City of Glendora, which has changed the name of the street officially to Route 66. The next stop is "Legends Classic Diner," a blast from the past, just newly opened in Glendora. Legends



Diner has a Route 66 atmosphere. The owner, Jimmy, has reserved the front part of his parking lot for the Corvette assembly and lunch is already prepared from an earlier call-in order. Jimmy also treated the group to dessert. Joining us at the Diner were

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members of Southern California Region Solid Axle Club. The parking lot quickly became a great visitor attraction and another photo opportunity. The desert chill is now gone and the temperature rises quickly.

Continuing after the second gas stop, the group passes the "Justice Brothers Racing



Museum" and the "Santa Anita" racetrack. The next stop is Team Chevrolet in Pasadena. At Team Chevrolet, the caravan is greeted by the dealership o wner, Dan Gaby, salesman and Corv ette owner, Rich Vasquez, and members of "Corv ettes Limited," the club sponsored by Team. Mr. Gaby has the used car lot empty for our arrival and circled by member cars from Corvettes Limited. They have drinks for the group and have had an article placed in the local paperA photographer from the local paper is also there.



Leaving Team Chevrolet and getting into downtown Pasadena, the traffic and streetlights become a challenge to keeping everyone together, but strategic spots allow all to reassemble. Departing Pasadena, Route 66 is on Arroyo Parkway, which turns into the 110 Free way. Route 66 departs the 110 on Sunset Boulevard. Here a slight deviation from an all-66 ride happens. Instead of departing Sunset on Santa Monica

Boulevard, the group continues on to Hollywood Boulevard to tour the sights along that popular route. From Hollywood Boulevard, all can see the "Hollywood" sign on the hills, Griffith Observatory, the "Sidewalk of the Stars," the Kodak Theatre and Grauman's Chinese Theatre. Departing Hollywood Boulevard on La Brea Avenue and then going onto Sunset Boulevard (The Sunset Strip), again the sights turn into The Whiskey A-Go-Go and The Laugh Factory. Sunset Boulevard is left on Beverly Boulevard into exclusive Beverly Hills. At this point, a stop is needed for a shor t repair. This is the only problem for the cars in the whole trip. Jerry's 57 Corvette experiences a broken upper rear shock mount. The quick fix is to remove the entire shock so that it does not drag on the road. This requires utilizing one of the local driveways to allow access without jacking the car. The repair operation draws much attention from people passing by and the locals from their balconies; not a sight that they regularly experience.

On down Beverly Boulevard, we pass Santa Monica for a quick pass up Rodeo Drive and the exclusive shops, then it is back onto Santa Monica Boulevard and Route 66 heading to the Ocean. By now the temperature is quite hot and the traffic is rush hour. The day has gone longer than plannedThe temperature and stop-and-go driving is a challenge. All make it to a final gas stop just before the ocean. This requires some time for the cars to cool. The final stop is the Santa Monica Pier. The local Corvette club of the south bay in Los Angeles, The Vette Set, is there to help with finding the proper parking location.

The sun is beginning to set. Locals and visitors on the pier are enjoying looking at the Corvettes. Some caravan participants enjoy a quick dip in the Pacific. The group is enjoying a restaurant on the pier and recalling the events of the day and the entire trip. The trip stories tell of memorable experiences ending with "The Last Leg," which is now a memory.

Corvettes and Turtles?

A wise man once said, "Every society is judged by how it treats its less fortunate." In 2003, the Pomona Valley Corvette Association in Southern California began a search for a worthy charity for the club to support. President Ansel Boyce assigned Vice-President and Car Sho w Chairman Randy Dimit to submit recommendations of various charities. The Painted Turtle Camp was under construction in Lake Hughes, CA and fit our criteria. PVCA chose The Painted Turtle as our charity because it realizes the dreams of children with chronic and life-threatening illnesses.

The Painted Turtle is the only multi-disease medical camp on the West Coast and is part of the Association of Hole in the Wall Gang Camps. Actor, racer and philanthropist Paul Newman's initial grant allowed for the purchase of the unique 183-acre setting. The rough and tumble environment helps to create a normal camp experience. The lake and the Adirondack chairs with the seat backs constructed to look like fish combine fun and functionality. The wood and stone buildings and the naturally wild and unruly landscape make the camp's design embody a true "regular camp" experience for the children. Even though not noticeable, the entire camp is wheelchair accessible.

The "Well Shell" best identifies the essence of The Painted Turtle Camp experience. It is the medical hub of the Camp. The building's Turtle shape only hints at what an amazing facility this is. The interior is not a "hospital-looking" hospital. "Tree-age" (triage) is set up in the image of a forest; tree murals cover the walls and the doctors provide treatment and make medical assessments from their tree-stump chairs. There are large leather loungers overlooking the lake for the campers undergoing dialysis or requiring other stationary medical care. Each cabin in the village is equipped with a special drainage system in the floor that allows campers on peritoneal dialysis to receive treatment in their bunks overnight. All necessary medical procedures are scheduled to allow campers to enjoy the maximum outdoor recreation experience, spending as little time as is necessary in the "Well Shell."

Each week of the camp session is designed to be disease specific. Possibly for the first time, many of these children are just like their peers. Campers receive superior medical care while at camp because of the partnerships the Camp has developed with the medical community. Disease-specific camps allow for California's top pediatric doctors and nurses to volunteer for camp sessions in the areas in which they specialize. Over fifty percent of the campers live at or below the federal poverty level and the medical care they receive at camp is frequently superior to their normal at-home care. Like all Hole in the Wall Gang Camps, The Painted Turtle has no billing department.

Rosemary Rodriguez, a member since 2003, started the PVCA Sewing Circle. Thousands of turtle-shaped pillows and bunk quilts have been hand made by The Los Angeles Area Quilting Guild and other Se wing Circles like PVCA's. Campers take home their turtle-shaped pillo w and bunk quilt as a positive reminder of their camp experience.

PVCA's first year of fundraising was busy. We promoted our car show at other shows and Corvette events, and even worked an auto auction at the California Speedway. Our first show was held inside a skating par k's airconditioned building and their parking lot. Our 50-50, raffle and silent auction were successes. A local group of la w-enforcement personnel, who f ormed a band years ago aptly named "Thief," donated their talents to our sho w. Our 2003 car show and other activities allowed PVCA to earmark our \$9,000 donation for the purchase of pad dleboats. We could visualize campers on the lak e, creating the memories that will last their lifetimes. Bennett Cerf said it best: "Laughter is the best medicine." We wanted our donations to be used to create fun and pure jo y for the c hildren. Our first "Turtle Tour," check and turtle pillow presentation, was held before the camp opened for its first session in June 2004.

The 2004 All-American Car and Truck Show was moved to Historic Downtown Upland by Sho w Chair Dave Armas. In cooperation with the Downtown Upland Merchants Association, we traded "man hours" by working at their annual Lemon Festi val's beverage booths in exchange for closing down six square blocks of the city. Setting up a mini-car sho w at their weekly Market Night helps to publicize the car show and provides the merchants with an additional dra w. This weekly activity gives our members a chance to socialize and show their vintage cars that cannot frequent our more spirited runs. The 2004 All-American Car and Truck Show became the largest publicly-held event for the benefit of The Painted Turtle Camp. Our fun-filled day included a live band, International Chili Society Cook-Off, Poker and Gimmick Rallye, exhibitions by local children's groups and an autograph session by three-time Olympic Gold medalist Leah O'Brien-Amico. We were able to raise additional funds through our silent auction, 50-50 and raffle. Our club members were thankful for our success and voted to fully fund the 2005 Fishing and Boating program with our \$20,000 donation. Our Sewing Circle brought more than 100 turtle pillows when we made our 2005 Turtle Tour. The camp had experienced a full summer and fall's camp sessions and we were all amazed at the changes since our last official visit.

Few people in Southern California are aware that a Hole in the Wall Gang Camp exists here. We held a public awareness event at the Irwindale Speedway's 2005 Southwest Tour Race. Selling car-show event shirts, collecting donations and showing the camp video increased the race spectators' awareness. PVCA members were able to exhibit their Corvettes to race fans at a mini car show and during a "Turtle Speed" lap on the track. Special thanks go out to Southern California's only half-mile super -speedway. Our 2005 All-American Car and Truck Show was bigger and better. Historic Downtown Upland graciously closed down eight city blocks and allowed for an even larger event. Our smalltown, tree-lined streets, wonderful restaurants and shopping created a welcome atmosphere for car-show enthusiasts and their families, too! The 2005 Car Show and other fundraising events enabled us to sponsor the 2006 Fishing and Boating Programs and contribute to the lake reclamation project at the camp with our \$25,000 donation, 2005 Car Show Chairman Duane Stidham, in cooperation with Big Lots, was able to fulfill many of the items on The Painted Turtle wish list through a combination of discounts and outright donations. PVCA's \$5,000 was well spent. This year's Turtle Tour included the more than 100 turtle pillows contributed by the PVCA Sewing Circle.

2005 President Brent Hicks and his wife Marilyn have been financial supporters of the Painted Turtle Camp. The Hicks have secured the donation of dairy products for the camp's needs through 2007 from Select Milk Producers of New Mexico and West Texas. Since 2003, Brent and Mar ilyn have hosted an annual brunch to help raise additional charity funds. Brent is a partner in the accounting firm GLY DeCauwer and they have been major cash contributors to our fund for several years. Other club members have solicited private donations on behalf of the Camp.

The impact the Camp has made on our membership has been profound. Our involvement has sparked a passion for The Painted Turtle Camp that has changed our own lives in the process of helping enrich the lives of these children and we have created great memories during our journey. PVCA membership has donated over \$65,000 in goods, services, and cash since 2003. PVCA remains the largest single non-corporate donor organization to The Painted Turtle. 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

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FINAL SELECTION


Being last is typically thought to be a negative thing, but that isn't always the case. In the Corvette world, "Corvettes at Carlisle" is a major

(2) It delivers passenger comforts and great highway capability while maintaining classic styling. It can cruise with the newest model Corvettes at the speeds they like to cruise, with 21 MPG performance that also delivers good range. It handles well. It has good reliability with all basic GN non-xotic components. All in all, there is Classic style and modern performance for the "Final Selection." (1)

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
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
