From the **Vice President Membership**

Well, it is finally spring up here in the Noth Country. We have our Vettes out and we have already had some g reat events. It should be another great season of NCCC events.

I would like to devote this report to talk about our membership process. As you may or may not know, our membership process is largely paper-based; hence, it is not real fast when it comes to processing membership applications. We have a team of Re gional Membership Directors who are currently working on ways to speed up and improve the current system. We also have a team of computer and software experts working on improving the current database system. These two teams have already come up with ways to eliminate the mailing of applications between my office and that of Rose Schmitt, National Distribution Manager. This results in a savings of a minimum of three days in getting the new member packets in the mail. Applications that I e-mail to Rose at the Distribution Center are sometimes processed in just a few hours and in the mail the same dy, which is a tremendous improvement over the way we were doing things. It will also result in a significant savings in postage costs, which means less of your dues money is being spent on operations. Improvements also need to be made in the time it takes to get applications from the clubs to the Regional Membership Directors. Implementing some of these improvements will mean that clubs will have to invest some of their time and money, much the same as they did when they made the move from stopwatches to timers and computer timing programs. Improvements in systems do not usually come free of any cost or effort. If you have ideas on improving our processes in NCCC, please talk to me, other National Officers, your Regional Officers or your Club Governor. One-way conversations do

not achieve the necessary results; however, engaging your officers in conversation may surprise you as to the good that can come out of these conversations. Are you ready to help?

I would like to thank all of the RMDS for their continued support of these process improvements and their participation on the process improvement teams.

Don't forget to read your Regional Officers' reports that can be found elsewhere in this issue of *Blue Bars*, as well as my membership reports.

A moment of silence in remembrance was taken.

Part of the reason for this is sometimes a bylaw comes in that is a very simple by-law and can be dealt with quickly; however, many other times by-law proposals come in and the y affect other committees such as finance, membership, and competition and

Clarifications

Had two clarifications presented last night:

- Can I run a non Z06 transmission in a regular C5 coupe in IIJ?Answerto preface this, the IIJ class was created by this committee at the beginning of this year. Since it is a new class that was created felt we had some latitude in how that class would operate. So, this clarification is only toward IIJ. Any C5 with any Z06 specific engine, transmission, or differential parts will be put in IIJ class. One consequence of this, the second clarification that was made in February is superseded by this clarification. In other words that clarification was about a Z06 cam in an LS1 engine and that would be in IIJ and not in group III.
- Three parts to this and only had to answer two. Can the Power Brake Vacuum system be replaced by a Hydra tech high performance hydraulic brake assist retrofit system and be installed on a group IIB car? Answer No. If no, can the system be installed on a group III B modified car? Answer Yes and this effectively answers whether it can be installed on an RP car.

Discussion ensued from question by Arnie Bailey re the clarification made at the February meeting.

Several hours at the Friday night meeting were spent on the new rulebook. The RCD's have made some progress, the goal is to produce a rulebook that is not only fair to all the competitors, trying to make it simpler and easier to read and able to quickly find answers. They will have a complete new rulebook for 2008. He is also looking at making the rulebook available electronically at some point in the future.

OLD BUSINESS

Pat Kelly announced she received the first rebate check from the sale of the FCOA T-shirts that was \$63.00, and she appreciates everyone's support. Manny modeled one to point out they do come in tent sizes.

Per Roger regarding the NCM expansion program, they have applied for a 2.5 mm grant for the expansion. The stipulation might be that they may have to begin construction in order to receive grant money. To do this they may have to borrow some money to begin the construction in order to get the grant money. For example if they need 5-6 million and they get 2.5 mm they may have to borrow 1mm to get that. From his perspective as a board member he has always been against borrowing money for this expansion however if in order to get money you borrow money this is a little bit of a different deal. The board has given tentative approval to at least consider some credit in the application of the grant in order to get this construction underway. It is stipulated only if it is demanded by, or constrained by the grant monies. If they do not get any grant money, there will not be any borrowing of money.

Re the ALMS race in Mid Ohio, several members helped them last year in supporting the museum by running the corvette corral. This was headed by Jerry Limpach, and members of his club and Bill and Peg Quine and members of their club. We had asked at the time that w as completed if this was going to happen again this year and the answer was no. Roger asked again as late as November and was told that Chevrolet had contracted with people to do those things; they did not need car clubs to help. Now Roger has received a note asking for our help, as the contractors have not worked out. Unfortunately the time is too short to prepare and we are unable to accommodate them.

NEW BUSINESS

No new business to report.

Roger mentioned that for the officer candidates that run and are successful, they would be invited to the November E-Board meeting to sit in and see what happens.

50/50 Raffle was \$170.00 to the winner Cindy Urenda.

Motion to adjourn was made and seconded. Meeting adjourned at 4:05 p.m.

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

The Northern Virginia Corvette Club holds its 1st "Sir Isaac Newton's Totally Awesome Driving School"

In the years 2004-2005 there were over 25 traffic deaths involving teenage drivers in the Washington D.C. Metropolitan area. On March 4, 2006, the members of the Northern Virginia Corvette Club ("NVCC") decided "enough is enough" and held their first teen driving school for young drivers in the Northern Virginia area.

This was not your typical Driver's Ed class. The young drivers were put though a series of real life situations in a controlled environment that tested their thinking, reflexes, reactions, and actions throughout the day. The school was set up with five different stations that the drivers rotated to throughout the day then met back in the class at the end of the day for a short debriefing and class certificate presentation. The five stations included:

- 1) Classroom instruction (2 sessions);
- 2) Braking exercises threshold braking, accident avoidance, and using ABS to maximum benefit;
- 3) Egg-shaped oval proper cornering, looking ahead, distractions, and proper breaking in turns;
- 4) Slalom weight transfer, cornering left to right, and being smooth; and
- 5) Wet skid pad forced oversteer and understeer, getting control of slides, and modifying driving to deal with slippery driving conditions.

As an added twist to the school, we allowed the parents to sit in the back seats so they could see first hand what their children were being taught, so they could learn also, and to gain confidence in their teen's ability to drive safely. From the testimonials that we have received from the parents, the y learned just as much, and had just as much fun as their teens did. Most asked if we could set up a class for the parents!

All students and parents received goody bags that included safety items for them to keep in their car including first aid kits, ice scrapers, and tire pressure gauges. Everyone also received a free lunch.

This school, which was limited to 50 students, was a mass effort by a los of people to keep it free for all the students. Without the support of the members of NVCC, Howard Snook of Long & Foster Realtors, Koons Chevrolet, Discount Tire Center, and Crossroads Online, this school wuldn't have happened. It also drew the attention of several county school systems, Chambers of Commerce, and businesses that came out to observe the school and offer their support for future teen driving events.

In short, everyone involved walked away with their head held high, a smile on their face, and proud that what they taught may prove to save the lift of one of these young drivers one day. NVCC is looking at doing 2-3 of these events a year.

Tombstone Run



Tombstone, AZ, often called "The Town Too Tough to Die," is the most famous of Arizona's old mining camps. When Ed Schieffelin arrived at Camp Huachuca in 1877 and wandered off to prospect in the hills nearby, his comrades said "Ed you will find your tombstone before you find silver." Well, nothing was further from the tr uth! When Ed staked his first claim, he named it "T ombstone." When rumors of the rich strikes made the mining camp a boomtown, the settlement adopted Ed's name. Over the next seven years, the mines produced millions and millions of dollars in silver and gold before underground water forced suspension of mining activities.

During the mining heydays, with thousands of treasure hunters seeking to strike it rich, Tombstone gained a reputation as a to wn steeped in violence and lawlessness. Tombstone, AZ is perhaps most famous for its Gunfight at the OK Corral on October 16, 1881 (a date very close to the date of our "Corvettes and Ghost Riders" events). The Earp brothers: Wyatt, Virgil and Morgan, along with friend Doc Holliday shot it out with the Clanton and McLaury Gang. The fierce gunfight was quick and when the bullets stopped flying, Billy Clanton, Tom McLaury and Frank McLaury lay dead. Virgil and Morgan Earp needed weeks to recover from serious wounds, but Doc Holliday was barely grazed by a bullet. Surprisingly, Wyatt Earp was unscathed. The storied feud that grew between the Earps and Doc Holliday and the Clantons, who were protected by territorial sheriff John Behan, was so full of bizarre twists that it has become the story told for over 100 years!

These days the "Corvettes and Ghost Riders" take over the little town of Tombstone with a new kind of raucousness hosted by Xtreme Corvettes, Corvette Motorsports, Vettes & Rods, and Desert Corvette Association. Last October, we filled the motels and hotels of Tombstone! We had over 250 Corvetters in for an NCCC 14-e vent weekend! The fun included a car show, rallyes, history walks, parties, and much more! We thank all our Corvette guests for attending our Run and we would love to see them again in 2006! This is a Corvette event that is open to everyone from near and far. If you are a fun-lower and are looking to ha ve a great time, join us for our 6 the Annual "Corvettes and Ghost Riders" Tombstone Run, October 5-6-7-8, 2006 and see what the wild, Wild West really means! This event has doubled in numbers year after year. Why? Because Tombstone is a special place indeed!

Visit Tombstone, AZ and you'll step back into the rough and tough days of western history. In the 1880's, Tombstone was a booming mining town that brought a rush of those looking to strike it rich. Gold and silver were the lures that also became magnets to thieves, cardsharks, murderers, rustlers and an abundance of unsavory bad guys.

The streets came alive with hundreds of saloons, gambling halls and bawdy houses.

CORVETTES AMERICA 2005

5th Annual Corvettes America Show held at GM Tech Center



A heavy overcast greeted Corvette enthusiasts on Saturday, August 13, 2005 as they arrived at the General Motors Technical Center in Warren, Michigan. This "rain or shine" show draws most of


its participants from Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Ontario, but some had come from Illinois and Rennsylvania and as far away as California. (The two entries from California drove the entire distance.)

The reasons for coming those distances were two-fold: first of all, to attend the largest all-Corvette show held in Michigan; and second, to do so at the GM Tech Center. The Tech Center has been the design and engineering home of every Corvette since the mid 1950's. All of the legendary names associated with the development and refining of the Corvette have walked the halls of the Tech Center: Zora Arkus-Duntov, Harley Earl, Ed Cole, Bill Mitchell, Dave McLellan, Larry Shinoda, John Cafaro and David Hill.

Despite a couple of brief showers, judging of the Show & Shine competition and balloting of the NCCC-sanctioned People's Choice c o m p e t i t i o n c o n t i n u e d throughout the morning. The



Celebrity Choice judging started promptly at 11:00 a.m. This year's Celebrity judge list read like a Who's Who of Corvette personalities. Included were Ed Peper – General Manager of GM's Chevrolet Division; David Hill – Corvette Chief Engineer; Tom Peters – C6 Chief



Designer; Kirk Bennion – Design Team Leader, C6 Exterior; Andy Bolig – Editor of *Corvette Enthusiast* magazine; Jerry Kohn – President of Corvette Central; Lance Miller – President of Carlisle Productions; Harlan Charles – Corvette Product Manager; and Jeff Cauley – President of Cauley Chevrolet, one of North America's leading Cor vette dealerships. Twelve lucky recipients went home with autographed Fenton Art Glass trophies to mark their participation in this show.

Participating suppliers included the country's best-known Corvette suppliers. Corvette Central, American Custom Industries, Lingenfelter Performance Engineering, Paragon Reproductions, Mallet Cars Ltd., Vette Essentials, and Speed Lingerie were among those suppliers populating the suppliers' display lot.

For the first time ever, GM opened the doors to the Vehicle Engineering Center lobby where a display of special-interest Corvettes could be seen. Corvettes on display included the Dale Earnhardt-driven C5-R #3 from the Chip Miller Emily's collection and the restored 1961 Gulf Oil SCCA championship-winning Corvette from a local owner's collection. Three of GM's styling Corvettes from the 1960's rounded out the lobby display.

At day's end, trophies were awarded in 11 classes in the Limited Entry Show & Shine competition and also in 11 classes of the NCCC-sanctioned People's Choice competition. Best of Show awards were presented in the stock, modified, and custom divisions of both competitions.

Despite the rain, more than 550 Cor vettes passed through the

gates on this day along with over 1,100 paid spectators. The proceeds from the show allowed America's Corvette Club (MI) to make c h a r i t a b l e contributions to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation.



the Karmanos Cancer Institute and special contributions for Huricane Katrina relief to both the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Over 100 members of America's Corvette Club (MI) wolunteered their time to make this show a success. And, as an example of fair gamesmanship, Corvettes belonging to club members were not eligible to win awards in any of the competitions. Members' rewards were participation in Michigan's largest all-Corvette show.

NOTE: By the way, the show this year is on August 12, which is during the NCCC convention. Our show is always the second Saturday in August. We really don't have a choice, since that is the day GM

allots us the use of their grounds. We have commitments from Dave McLellan, David Hill and Tom Wallace to participate this year. As far as we know, this is the only time all three living Corvette Chief Engineers will be in one place at the same time this year.

We meet at least twice monthly and have a number of social activities during the year as well as our participation competitive events.

The 2005

competition season for the club actually started in 2004. Several club members were discussing how nice it would be if, at the 2006 NCCC convention, which would be in Florida, NFCA could be presented the Trophy for #1 for 2005. Well, that started us to thinking – we can do that – but we will have to plan ahead – attend as many events as possible – take at least 15 club members on each road trip and cover as many classes as possible. Our club had great teamwork with members like Gay Septon working almost every event in the Region and even working out-of-region events. Over 40% of our club membership

either worked or participated in events during the year. It was also exciting to see so many of our less experienced club members become excellent drivers, fully capable of winning their class and group, as the year progressed. Well done, NFCA!

We enjoyed traveling together on our road trips, driving new tracks, going to new shows and enjoying the

outstanding hospitality of other NCCC clubs. The best thing of all – our club members still talk to, and support, each other.



We meet quarterly to update them with ne ws from the National Governors' Meetings and to conduct Regional business. Regional Officers are also available to all members via e-mail or phone. Lary, Ellouise, and I attend as many events as possible and are always happy to visit with each of you. The best part of this job is all the great people we get to know.

I know your club Governors do a good job of keeping you informed, because I see their reports in your newsletters. Between club meetings, remember to check the RMR and NCCC websites frequently to keep yourself up-to-date on events and all the exciting things going on.



CliffHarris, our RMD, suggested we give

you a basic idea of the main Corvette events and if you want additional information, the NCCC Competition Handbook goes into detail on each type of event.

Car Show-People's Choice: You park your car and clean off any road dirt. You get a ballot and vote by class on the cars you like best.

Car Show-Concours: Much stricter. Judges evaluate your car based on a judging sheet that calls out certain things for them to examine. The advantage of this event is you get a copy of the judging sheet to help you clean for the next show.

Rallye: Requires a navigator. You are given a set of instructions that leads you to a final destination and along the way are checkpoints and usually questions to answer to make it interesting to say the least.

Autocross: Low speed events less than 80 mph are what we hold in this Region in most cases. The courses are usually short ($^{1}/_{2}$ to $^{3}/_{4}$ of a mile) and on a flat surface such as a parking lot or air port. They are mark ed out with orange cones and there is only one car on the course at a time, so you do not have to worry about bumping another car. Many classes so you run against cars like yours and the object is to get around the course the quickest.

If your club puts on an event and you want to share the fun, do not keep it a secret. It only takes an email message or a fl yer sent to the West Coast Region Webmaster, Cliff Harris, to get your event on the Regional calendar. You will meet great people who share your interests, like the Corvette and fun. If you want to put on a more serious event like a car show or rallye, get in touch with Les Rajczi, our Regional Competition Director, for information on how to do it. Easy and fun. With only a little guidance from Les, you can do it. Remember that NCCC is a National organization. We're not the only region having fun. Check out the messages from the other regions; you just might get an idea for a great event your club can do.

The Regional meeting will be September 30 in RedlandsAsk your club Governor about the location.All NCCC members are velcome to come to the meeting and participate in the running of your Region.

"A Legend Reborn"

Celebrating 10 Years of Performance! 1996 - 2006

1996, as I'm sure most of you know, was to be the last year for the C-4 Corvette. GM wanted to build a special car to honor this edition of the Corvette and the Grand Sport would be that car. The 1996 Grand Sport would have a limited production of 1,000 cars with a paint scheme to match the 1963 Grand Sports and a power plant that put out 330 horsepower. The Admiral blue paint with the bold White stripe is captivating. When you see a line of Corvettes in a parking lot, there can be one GS and that will be the one that catches your eye. This would also be the last run for theenerable small block Chevrolet engine that had been used in one form or another since 1955. It would be replaced in the 1997 model year with an all-aluminum \$\mathbb{L}\$1.

The **Grand Sport Owners Registry** was founded in 1996 by Jim Van Dorn of LaQuinta, California (now residing in Bowling Green, Kentucky). Jim's business, Auto Masters, was a very well known and respected shop for some extreme high-performance Corvettes, including Grand Sports and ZR-1's. Many will remember Jim as the driving force behind the **Pirate Racing Team**, which was, in its day, the top SCCA/Speedvision World Challenge team with ZR-1 and LT4 racecars and noted drivers, such as Bill Cooper and John Heinricy, behind the wheel. Due to the growing demands of his business and family, Jim reluctantly had to admit he did not have the time to devote to the **GSR**, since it was growing at a pace too rapid to keep up with. After months of discussion, it was agreed that John "Hutch" Hutchinson of Orlando, Florida, would take over the reigns of the GSR and attempto grow it into something "JVD" himself would be proud of. And the rest, as they say, is history.

Since those early days, the **Grand Sport Registry** has grown to a sizable mature organization with an ever-expanding list of members (now over 350) stretching across the country and as far away as Europe and Australia. We have tracked down ownership and vehicle information on over 70% of all 1,000 Grand Sports and have verified the RPO option data on every single car. The GSR is licensed by General Motors to use its trademarks for the purpose of expanding interest in the Grand Sport and Corvette marquee and helping its members get more enjoyment out of their Corvette ownership.

In 2003, GSR Membership was opened to all Corvette enthusiasts, including 1996 Z16 GS and re gular production LT4 owners, 1963 GS replica owners, and anyone with a serious interest in the Covette Grand Sport. In addition to Regular and Lifetime members, the GSR also includes John Heinric y and the owners of the f ive original 1963 Grand Sport ts amongst its list of Honorar y Members.


Besides collecting and sharing information on these unique Corvettes, the GSR's other passion is supporting the National Corvette Museum. As a Business Member of the NCM, the GSR and its membership continue to provide support through individual and group contributions. Recent contributions include purchasing a wooden bench to benefit weary visitors to the Museum, Flint brick wall, land and building campaigns, a 2'x2' GSR brick, and 45 very special "Hashmarks" individual bricks unveiled during the Gathering Event in May 2005.

The GSR is also a familiar sight at large national events, such as The Gathering at the NCM in Ma y and Corvettes at Carlisle in August. To celebrate the 10 th Anniversary of the Grand Sport, the GSR is making a push to assemble 96 Grand Sports in one place at Corvettes at Carlisle. Currently they already have over 100 Grand Sports registered so, if you go, you should not have any trouble finding them... just look for a sea of Blue and White Corvettes!


